Comprehension

- 1. How many characters are mentioned in the poem?
- 2. Select two characters and write your thoughts on them: What are the inferences you can draw about them? Explain.
- 3. Descriptive Writing Imagine that you are inside this bar listening to the piano man playing. Describe the surrounding and how you feel. Use a mix of imagery (Visual/Auditory/Gustatory/Tactile/Olfactory). Use metaphors, similes or personification if possible.

Write 200-250 words.

The story should end with the character deciding to go out to get some fresh air.

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7. Look at the explanations given below.

'Son can you play me a memory.' This line replaces the word melody with 'memory.' But it captures the request of the old man who may probably be asking the piano man to play a melody which would bring back memories when he was a younger man. The writer makes the memory into an auditory imagery; for the imaginative reader, the vague, abstract concept of a memory is woven into the tune that he plays.

'Makin' love to his tonic and gin' – This old man has no one to be intimate with. The phrase making love connotes intimacy – someone with whom you can share the joys and struggles of life. But he only has his drinks to vent to. That's the only thing that keeps him company; the only company he has. In this phrase, the verb 'making love' is a metaphor because it compares the action with what he is actually doing – drinking.

'Bill I believe this is killing me.' – Exaggeration/Hyperbole. The phrase effectively captures how John feels like his life is wasting away. His dreams have already been killed.

'Waitress is practicing politics' – Waitresses at bars filled with men who come to drink and make merry are always in a precarious situation because they may have to face unscrupulous, or drunk customers who have no civility. Therefore, they have to negotiate their dignity – they have to be careful and walk a tightrope of not lashing out at the customers who may crack sexist jokes, while also ensuring their safety and dignity.
